Many miles from the closest mainland, the tiny crescent-shaped archipelago of the Magdalen Islands (Îles-de-la-Madeleine) feels remote in so many ways.

Here, far away from the outside world, a constant breeze sweeping over these 12 islands has sculpted red sandstone cliffs, dwarfed the forests, and formed sand dunes, connecting some islands together and enclosing a series of lagoons protected from the open seas. Settled permanently since the 18th century, the people here have also adapted to this remarkable environment and created a unique culture. Over the course of our week here based in our sea-view auberge, we have a chance to explore this world apart and experience a sense of solitude and connection where time seems to have stood still.

Walk sand-dune trails with delicate plants and explore the interdunal bogs, fens, and saltmarshes, watching for sundews and other fragile plant life. Attune to the sights and sounds of migratory shorebirds and resident waterbirds (including highly localized Black-headed Gulls!) as they rest and feed along unspoiled beaches and in the lagoons. Watch for Grey and Harbour Seals looking back at us as they course the shallows. While walking along paths at higher altitudes, we may see a number of songbirds in a surprisingly boreal habitat and get sweeping views of the archipelago as we enjoy the fresh sea air. We also gain a sense of the cultural mosaic deriving from French-speaking Acadia and the British Isles as we visit the friendly island communities. Our meals are always a highlight, and we can expect selections featuring seafood and more with local flair! Each day is sure to yield something different.

For a short, restorative trip to an out-of-the-way part of Canada, join us as we enjoy a week of discoveries on the Magdalens!



Study Leader

Alan Watson is a retired faculty member in the School of Environmental Sciences at the University of Guelph, where he taught nature interpretation, environmental stewardship, and a conservation field course. He also recently retired from his long-standing role as Director of the university's Arboretum. He has over 25 years of experience leading tours, including to such places as Trinidad and Tobago, the Lesser Antilles, Costa Rica, Brazil, Tanzania, the Galapagos Islands, and the Magdalen Islands. Alan is also a cetacean expert, having studied Harbour Porpoises in depth. He has extensively explored the Magdalens and led tours here several times in past years. Alan will be joined by an expert local guide to add extra depth to your discoveries.

Detailed Itinerary

Sunday, September 21: Arrive on the Magdalen Islands

This afternoon, we are met upon arrival at the airport in the Magdalens and transported to our lodge on Grosse Île. We have an orientation with our Worldwide Quest study leader, meet our local hosts, and then enjoy a welcome dinner. Depending on time and daylight, we may have a chance to begin casual explorations of the landscapes right at our doorstep.

Monday, September 22 – Friday, September 26: Exploring the Magdalens

We spend these five days exploring various habitats and elevations on several of these islands, most of which are connected by road or sand dune but for one (Entry Island or Île d'Entrée), which we must reach by ferry. We may also visit some museums and artisans' workshops, with a chance to speak with the locals and learn about life on the islands. Lunches may be had in the field, at local establishments, or back at our lodge depending on the day's activities. On one afternoon, we plan to take some time to visit the Seal Interpretive Centre (Centre d'interprétation du phoque), which is located right inside our lodge. This museum showcases the several seal species that reside in the archipelago and expounds on the relationships the human residents have with them. Shorebird migration is in full swing at this time of year, so there should be many opportunities to observe a wide variety of species.

Saturday, September 27: Departure

Today after breakfast and depending on the flight schedules, we may have a chance for some light explorations around our lodge before heading to the airport for our homeward flights. Farewell, fair isles!

Joining Instructions

Arrival: Sunday, September 21

This tour begins at noon at the Îles-de-la-Madeleine Airport. Travellers will be met by our local hosts. If you are making your own pre-trip arrangements, you will have to make arrangements for transportation to your pre-trip hotel.

Departure: Saturday, September 27

Travel Documents

Canadians must have a government-issued photo ID to board a plane for flights within Canada. British Subjects and citizens of the USA must have a valid passport to visit Canada.



Weather

Temperatures in the Magdalens are refreshing and moderated by the Gulf of St. Lawrence. We can expect temperatures ranging from about 15°C (59°F) during the day to 9°C (37°F) at night. We expect a mix of sun and cloud with some possible rain and a comfortable amount of humidity in the air.



Transportation

We use a comfortable 24-passenger minibus for our tour. This should allow for plenty of spacing, and our leader will organize a daily seat rotation.

Level of Activity: Easy to Moderate

While this is not a particularly strenuous trip and none of our hikes are particularly long or fast, you should bear in mind that walking on rough paths is sometimes more difficult than on hard ground or pavement. Good firm walking shoes, and perhaps a trekking pole for extra balance, will maximize your enjoyment of this trip.



Accommodation

La Salicorne is our favourite place to stay in the Magdalens, as it invites authentic immersion in the Madelinot way of life. The furniture is made by a local cabinet maker; the food is locally sourced and prepared by island cooks; you can see the ocean from both sides owing to the inn's perch atop a hill. Rooms are cozy and inviting and prepared with keen attention to detail.
